

HISTORY IN THE MAKING

Ismini Samanidou's digitally fashioned fabrics have their inspiration in the past

ost people seek out Cornwall for its sea air and pasties, but Greek-born textile artist Ismini Samanidou followed her nose there on a very different quest. In 2004, while on the hunt for a computerised jacquard loom – an industrial weaving machine designed to run off large quantities of fabric, perfect for the production of her wall hangings and bespoke textiles – she discovered the Craft Council's 'Next Move' scheme, which helps designer-makers access workspaces and equipment; it bagged her a loom and a teaching place at Falmouth College.

Like many textile designers, Ismini says it's the process of her work that interests her. She begins by taking snaps of subjects or producing photograms (images made by placing an object on photographic material in a darkroom and exposing it to light), then transfers them onto a computer, applying weave structures to patterns and creating

an artist-like palette of yarns to select from. 'The beauty of impermanence is a big inspiration for me, particularly the way that surfaces change,' she explains. This is most notable in her pieces inspired by 15th-century National Trust property Godolphin House in Cornwall, where she collaborated with upholsterer Richard Hooper to create pieces for design collective Hidden Art. Instead of focusing on the house's decorative wall tapestries, Ismini looked to their undersides and the 18th-century wallpapers they concealed: the result was 'Hidden', a panelled screen (above) with distressed patterns that exude faded glamour.
